Clarifications to select questions

Q.8 : Ans. : (C). Clarification : 'C' 'Neither . . . nor' is the correct option. 'either . . . or' also could have been fitted well thereat, provided the first letter 'e' would have been a capital letter.

Q.12 : Ans. : (B). Clarification : 'B' : 'has left' is the correct option. The word 'already' renders it correct as the action in present perfect tense.

Q.14 : Ans. : (B). Clarification : 'B' : 'went' is the correct option. As there is no other completed action mentioned or expressed in any context in the same sentence, we need not use past perfect 'had gone', which one may think of.

Q.15 : Ans. : (A). Clarification : A comma is used for separating the name of the author from the name of the book, but not when a verb comes in between, viz. 'wrote'.

Q.26 : Ans. : (B). Clarification : 'D' can not be the answer. In 'E.' there is a mention of the words 'these planets'. That refers to 'C. . . . has nine planets'. Further, these nine planets have a description about them in 'A.', so 'A' has to follow 'E.' And then comes 'B' because it talks of sub-planets or satellites.

Q.30 : Ans. : (A). Clarification : Here we are not discussing where a rabbit habitually lives. We are only testing the understanding of the use of a correct preposition in that context. Please see what we are instructed to do, above that question. A rabbit or similar animal, lives 'in' and not 'under' a bush.

Q.31 : Ans. : (B). Clarification : 'B' : 'on' is the correct option. 'Below' is at or to a lower level than something. So it won't fit in. 'Under' could have been other possible correct option.
