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#### Explanations and answers to select questions

01. The parts of speech are 8 (eight) in number. They are : Noun, Pronoun, Adjective, Verb, Adverb, Preposition, Conjunction and Interjection. 'Article' is not a part of speech. So, option 'A' is the correct answer.
04. 'Chick' is a baby chicken. And the sound made by a chick is 'Cheep'. The sound made by a grown up 'Chicken' is 'Cluck'. So, option 'D' : 'Cheep' is the correct answer.
10. The two adjectives are : 'timely' and 'useful'.  
  
'Two' is the correct answer. The adjectives are : 'His', a possessive adjective and 'timely', an adjective of quality. Possessive adjectives in English refer to the possessor and not to the thing possessed. 'His' could have been a possessive pronoun if it would have appeared after the noun 'action' as in, "The useful timely action was his". So, option 'B' is the correct answer.
12. 'Rain' is not a collective noun. It is an uncountable noun addressed mostly in singular. Only when it is referred to as a season, though uncountable, it is addressed in the plural as in, 'This year we received heavy rains'. Every collective noun is essentially a singular noun as it denotes 'one undivided whole', and can be made into a plural; like 'flock' and 'flocks'; 'herd' and 'herds', etc. 'Cloud' is a collective noun for smoke. So, option 'B' is the correct answer. 'Storm' is not a collective noun.
16. Option (D) is the correct answer. Option (A) can not be the correct answer, because, in there, the first word 'every', doesn't start with a capital letter, which is a requirement, as that word comes in the beginning of that sentence.

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
