Explanations and answers to select questions

- 01 Option (D) is the correct answer. Its homophone is : 'Scul'.
02 Option (B) is the correct answer. It is the same spelling for its plural.
05 Option (C) is the correct answer. Possessive adjectives in English (his) refer to the possessor and not to the thing possessed; 'dark' is a noun here.
06 Option (B) is the correct answer. The eight 3-lettered words are : col, con, cow, low, now, owl, own and won.
15 Option (C) is the correct answer, because the reference is to a specific half.
19 Option (B) is the correct answer. The phrase 'together with' is not a conjunction and neither does it work as one. That leaves the verb, only a singular subject (Hari) to agree with.
20 Option (C) is the correct answer. Options (A) and (B) to be correct, need 'that' to be added after 'heard'.
21 Option (C) is the correct answer. It is a second conditional (If+past simple (got), would +infinitive (get)).
23 Option (C) is the correct answer. The word 'grasshopper' represents a species of insects, and it being a particular species of insects, we need to use 'The' before it. As the sound produced by the first syllable of 'insect' is a vowel sound as in 'ink', 'an' before it.
26 Option (D) is the correct answer. When 'Either' . . . 'or' is used, the subject closer to the verb determines the number of the verb. Here 'one', a singular decides that, so, 'comes'.
32 Option (D) is the correct answer. The reporting verb (*will say*) being in future tense, there is no change of tense in the reported speech without quotes.
35 Option (C) is the correct answer. A passive form is not possible in case of past perfect continuous tense, which is the case here.
